Welcome to Madison Hall

A Matter of Life

David Knepper and his wife, Judith Fernet, are OLLI members whom seem very health-conscious. They are slim, they exercise, and they eat wholesome foods. There was no reason why they would suspect health problems, they just completed their physicals. But, after discussing it with their physicians, they scheduled Life Line Screening tests. David tested-out fine. Judith's tests, however, indicated a very significant carotid artery obstruction which was verified by her physician. She had carotid artery surgery in May. David states, **"The salient point in this is that Judith had no symptoms and had no indication of the carotid artery obstruction prior to the Life Line Screening tests."** Had Judith not discovered the problem, the outcome would have been much different.

Life Line Screening describes their purpose as follows: "The mission of Life Line Screening is to make people aware of an undetected health problems through health screenings and tests and encourage them to seek follow-up care with their physician. We are dedicated to providing the highest quality preventive screenings at an affordable rate."



Making a Decision for the Elections May Be Easier After the Summer Enrichment Series 2008 ... Or Maybe Not?

As Sergeant Friday says, "Give me the facts, and nothing but the facts!" That's what the audience got plenty of on Tuesday, July 22, when they listened to the first of four segments of the Summer Enrichment Series. Just when we thought we made a political decision, we were given more food for thought by three informative speakers who gave their views of the day's topics, Global Concerns and American Diplomacy.

Dr. Gregory Casteel, UAH Instructor, detailed an interesting timeline of American attitudes which he described as changing from a comfortable internal to a watchful external focus after WWI, the Cold War and then again after 911. He compared the attitudes of other countries to that of the US after the backslide of 911. He also speculated on America's future global role.

Foster Perry spoke of foreign trade, policy, emerging competitors and partners. His handouts included a map of the US in which each state's gross income matched that of a foreign country. According to the map, Alabama and Iran are economically equal. There were no comparisons for the vast fortunes of China and India.

Dr. Kathleen Hawk, UAH Chair, Political Science, and Commander, U.S. Navy Reserve, Naval Intelligence, touched on foreign relations and policy, present and future. She also gave a brief rundown of the inner turmoil of Iraq, describing the mindset of the Sunni, Shia, and Kurd people and why the regions are in conflict.

Bob Crowe, Coordinator, was the announcer, and provided members with some very interesting data. The program coordinators, Barbara Lucero and Mary Compton, once again did a marvelous job of planning the Series to fruition. We are looking forward to more exciting Tuesday mornings in August (schedule on page 1).
