Lecture on Wearable Robotics Kicks Off 20th Anniversary Celebration Speakers' Series

Dr. Michael Goldfarb (right), Vanderbilt professor and researcher with a Ph.D. from MIT, had a spellbound audience of OLLI members and visitors on August 15. 2013. Using PowerPoint and film, he explained and illustrated his advanced research in wearable robotics or 'bionic' prosthetic devices.



The Goldfarb lecture kicked off the recognition of OLLI's 20th Anniversity Celebration Speakers' Series. It was therefore fitting to 'see' the OLLI organization: seeing it was accomplished through Lorrie White's wonderfully inclusive slide show of OLLI classes, committees, volunteers, and activities. Dr. Karen M. Clanton, Director of Professional and Continuing Studies, welcomed everyone, and OLLI President Jerri McLain spoke briefly about OLLI's twenty-year milestone. Goldfarb was introduced by Dr. Charles Richard Chappell, a Research Professor of Physics at Vanderbilt University. Chappell pioneered a program for the local PBS station in Nashville with the concept of introducing present-day explorers to viewers. Goldfarb and his research were included.

Goldfarb and other researchers, including graduate students working toward the Ph.D degree, have developed and are testing devices for one limb missing, the bilateral amputee (both arms missing) and for paraplegia. His slides illustrated the devices being tested on human models in varied motion.

The presentation also emphasized the extreme differences between his motorized devices, designed more naturally to approximate the way our neurological systems allow natural movement, and non-motorized devices that provide assistance but rely heavily on the body's muscles and cause frequent falling of the wearer.

Dr. Goldfarb's illustrations were extremely impressive in showing the levels of testing, emphasizing the robotics' ability to perform daily tasks to enhance normal living, and demonstrating the agility of wholehand robotics and of the lower extremity exoskeleton for paraplegics.

This promising technology is on the

path from research to the marketplace. Dr. Goldfarb said that the leg has been licensed and the process is underway to make the device available for use "at least in a limited way." The same process is also underway for the exoskeleton for the paraplegic. In part, funding for the projects has come from the National Institute of Health (NIH) and the Army.

Dr. Goldfarb engaged numerous questions from the audience at his conclusion, and was kept in the auditorium afterwards by more discussion. He was missing a scrumptious reception in the auditorium lobby! Tables decorated with magnificent hydrangeas from Jerri McLain's yard were laden with all manner of delicious tidbits.

Much thanks and hats off to the Cultural, Social, Member Services, and Publicity Committees for a fine program and an exceptional reception!

Call for Research Subjects

The Lifelong Learning Lab (LLL) at The University of Alabama in Huntsville conducts research examining how memory and learning change across the lifespan. The LLL is currently looking for individuals <u>60 to 85 years of</u> <u>age</u> to participate in a new experiment. The one session experiment will take approximately 90-120 minutes to complete and involves several paper-based tasks as well as a computerized task where you will be asked to study word pairs (e.g., paperclip – yarn) presented in different sized fonts and to predict how likely you will be to remember them on a recall test. No prerequisite skills are needed other than normal (or corrected to normal) vision, but we need your help! We can test up to six people at a time. Participants will receive \$10 compensation for their time.

Please note that those who recently participated in the other "font study" in the last few months are *not* eligible to participate in this study, given the similar nature of the tasks. If you would like to schedule an appointment to participate in this study or want additional information, please contact the LLL at (256) 824-4590.
